# HUM 203 - INTRODUCTION TO SOCIAL ANTHROPOLOGY

(3+0) 3 credits 5 ECTS

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### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course offers an in-depth introduction to the fundamental concepts and issues of social anthropology. Students will explore human diversity through a relativistic lens, gaining insights into the various cultural, social, and biological aspects that shape human societies. By examining anthropological theories and methodologies, students will develop critical thinking skills and a comprehensive understanding of cultural practices and social structures worldwide.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the scope and significance of anthropology.
- 2. Identify and explain the major specializations within anthropology.
- 3. Apply a holistic perspective to analyze human life.

- 6. Conduct basic ethnographic research and analyze anthropological data.
