

HUM 203 - INTRODUCTION TO SOCIAL ANTHROPOLOGY

(3+0) 3 credits 5 ECTS

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course offers an in-depth introduction to the fundamental concepts and issues of social anthropology. Students will explore human diversity through a relativistic lens, gaining insights into the various cultural, social, and biological aspects that shape human societies. By examining anthropological theories and methodologies, students will develop critical thinking skills and a comprehensive understanding of cultural practices and social structures worldwide.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Describe the scope and significance of anthropology.
2. Identify and explain the major specializations within anthropology.
3. Apply a holistic perspective to analyze human life.
4. Recognize and discuss patterns of social life across cultures.
5. Evaluate cultural diversity through the lens of cultural relativism.
6. Conduct basic ethnographic research and analyze anthropological data.
